

<u>Actions focused on learning in the curriculum</u>		
<u>Activity/Project/Initiative</u>	<u>Cost</u>	<u>Impact</u>
1:1 tuition 12 weeks x 9 pupils	£2,000	Identified children will receive focused support to enhance key skills in a core subject
TA support from teaching assistants for vulnerable pupils and resources (equivalent to 2.5 full time TA's)	£30,669	Achieve consistency with the interventions. Raise standards in reading (+ phonics), writing and maths. This is analysed through performance data.
Preschool Milk	£300	To ensure that all young children are given a healthy snack/drink during the school day.
Sports Coach dinner time club £20 (x 36 weeks)	£720	Children to become motivated so will raise children's confidence
Literacy volunteer	£300	Identified children benefit from extra reading intervention
CPD opportunities to improve the quality of teaching and learning	£3,000	Staff to have a greater knowledge of teaching to the needs of vulnerable groups including higher attainers within their class.
1 day a week experienced teacher to work with identified pupil premium children	£7,525	Identified children will receive focused support to tackle barriers to learning.


KS2 attainment for disadvantaged pupils 2019

Average Scaled Score (Re, Ma)





Average Scaled Score (Re, Ma)





Scaled Score Reading





Scaled Score Reading





Scaled Score Maths





Scaled Score Maths





Scaled Score Writing





Scaled Score Writing














Scaled Score Grammar, Punctuation & Spelling

In the 2018-2019 academic year there were 3 pupils in **FS2** categorised as disadvantaged. None of them achieved a GLD.

<u>Actions focused on social, emotional and behavioural</u>		
<u>Action</u>	<u>Cost</u>	<u>Impact</u>
Positive Play and ELSA taught by a TA	£2,500	Selected children have one to one discussions with a third party to help them to discuss personal issues and aid self- confidence.

ELSA/Positive Play interventions have supported:

- loss and bereavement
- social skill
- communication skills
- understanding and regulating emotions
- friendship issues and bullying
- self-esteem and removing barriers to learning

All of this has made a significant positive impact on the emotional wellbeing of children and their ability to manage better at school — socially, emotionally and academically.

<u>Actions focused on enrichments beyond the curriculum</u>		
<u>Action</u>	<u>Cost</u>	<u>Impact</u>
Trips linked to the curriculum	£1,900	Children have the opportunity to learn outside the classroom
Music lessons (7 lessons @ £5.90 per lesson)	£1,000	Selected children are given the opportunity to learn a lifetime skill of playing a musical instrument. This in turn will help to support their learning in the classroom.

The Pupil Premium funding has been incredibly useful in providing some of our disadvantaged children access to different cultural and enriching experiences, that they may not normally have been able to access.

This has increased the cultural capital they have and that they can apply across the curriculum.
